



# HORTICULTURE

It is not too late to plant Iris, Minitures for Apr. many are Fall blooming, Tall bearded and Siberian for late May through June, Aristocrats for early May, Japanese for July, Dichotoma for August. Autumn Flowering tall bearded varieties for all through Fall.

Visit the nurseries to see the August and September blooming lilies. Try especially to visit Paradou, the Scheepers display garden on route 25A at Brookville. A call at Paradou and luncheon at the Old Mill in Roslyn make a delightful and profitable garden pilgrimage — if extended to Gardens on Parade at the Fair, a most satisfactory day.

Look at the late blooming varieties of Hemerocallis or Day Lilies and the new varieties of Althea, or Rose of Sharon at the nurseries.

It is time for evergreen moving, so any contemplated changes are best made at this season, the earlier, the better. Transplants need faithful watering to get a good start for the winter and that can best be done before starting back to town. Two weeks of personal supervison will mean much more than the casual watering that is apt to result when left to someone other than the owner of the plant. Water needs to go on by the pailful.
