





For the duration of the war no one will be allowed on the beach after dark, and no boats will be allowed out after dark unless the occupants are provided with special Coast Cuard passes which extend them the privelege of fishing or bouting after dark. Whether you possess a pass or not you are not allowed to use lights which are not shielded properly or to light fires on or near the beaches. These are not requests by the local authorities but Governmental orders which will be enforced by members of the Armed Forces. REMEMBER always stop when challenged.




