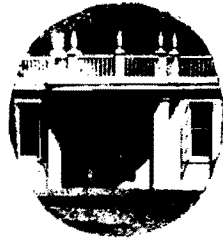

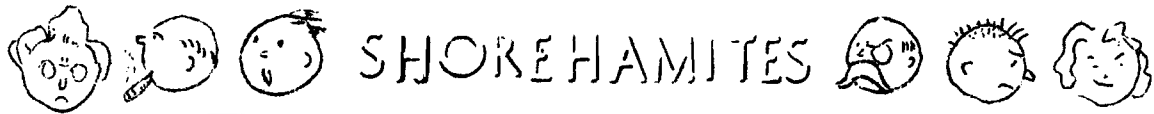
## CLUB OPENING STARTS SEASON

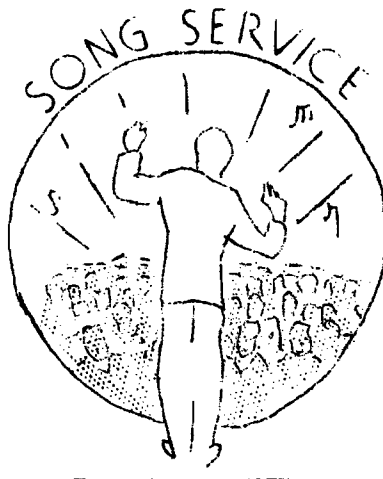
Mr. and Mrs. Harold Fee and their daughters, Barbara and Marjorie from Mt. Vernon will be the guests of Mrs. Gridley.

Miss Ruth Beth Healy of Richmond Hill, Queens, L. I. has been the guest of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. DuCret.

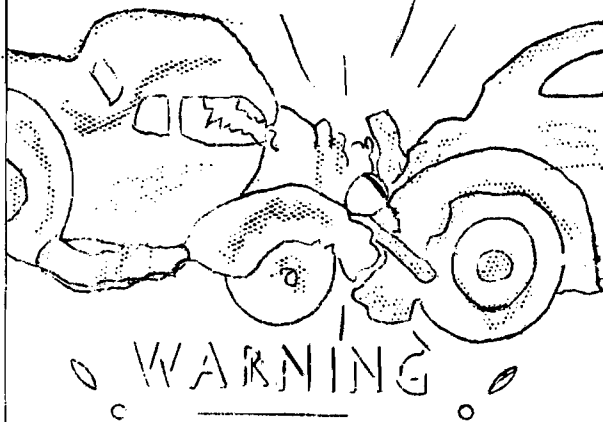
Christopher Birch will visit his mother in Peapack, New Jersey, for a short time.

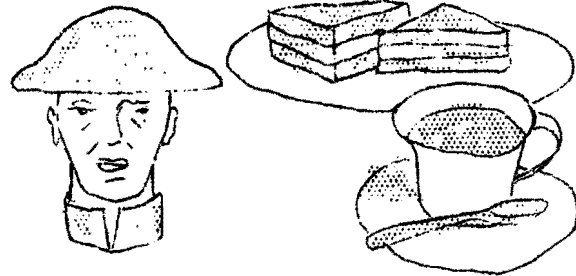

After eating, Susan opened her birthday gifts. Then everybody joined in a game of keep-away; the boys against the girls. A wonderful time was had by all.

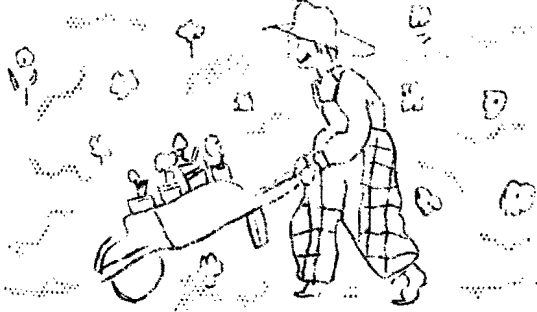


## CANTEEN SERVICE

## HORTICULTURE



A good time to fertilize trees, peonies and all the hardy perennials that have finished their blooming period. Wood ashes are very helpful as the potash they yield help to increase the color of the flowers. It is time to begin taking up and thinning-out Iris borders also, not taking every plant at any one time, as they will not bloom the year after they have been disturbed, so that all the Iris blooms are lost to the garden for that time.

Rambler roses are due for their annual heavy pruning. All old wood and dead blossoms shall be removed. The poly-anther roses also bloom with greater vigor later in the summer if the dead blossoms are regularly removed. Pitch back any rose shoots that are growing too tall. Roses need fertilizer at this time, and sulphur dust. Do you remember the recipe for massey dust? Nine parts of powdered sulphur to one part arsenate of lead. Cheaper than the packaged dust, and effective for fungus diseases, the arsenate of lead discouraging chewing insects, it is a formula named for one of our best rosarians.

Potted plants do well if re-potted now, rather than later in the summer. It is a good practise to re-pot them, trim them well and then place

We would like to take this opportunity to request that persons with wet bathing suits will refrain from entering the upper-part of the club-house. Please cooperate.

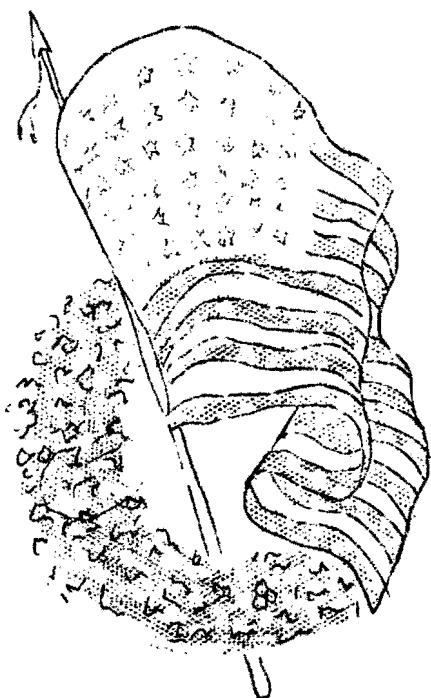

them out in the garden, preferable in a shaded and sheltered spot, placing the pots into the soil up to the top. In the early fall they are ready to be taken in for the winter, without the shock of both re-potting and the change of location coming at the same time.

If you follow these instructions your potted plants will thrive.

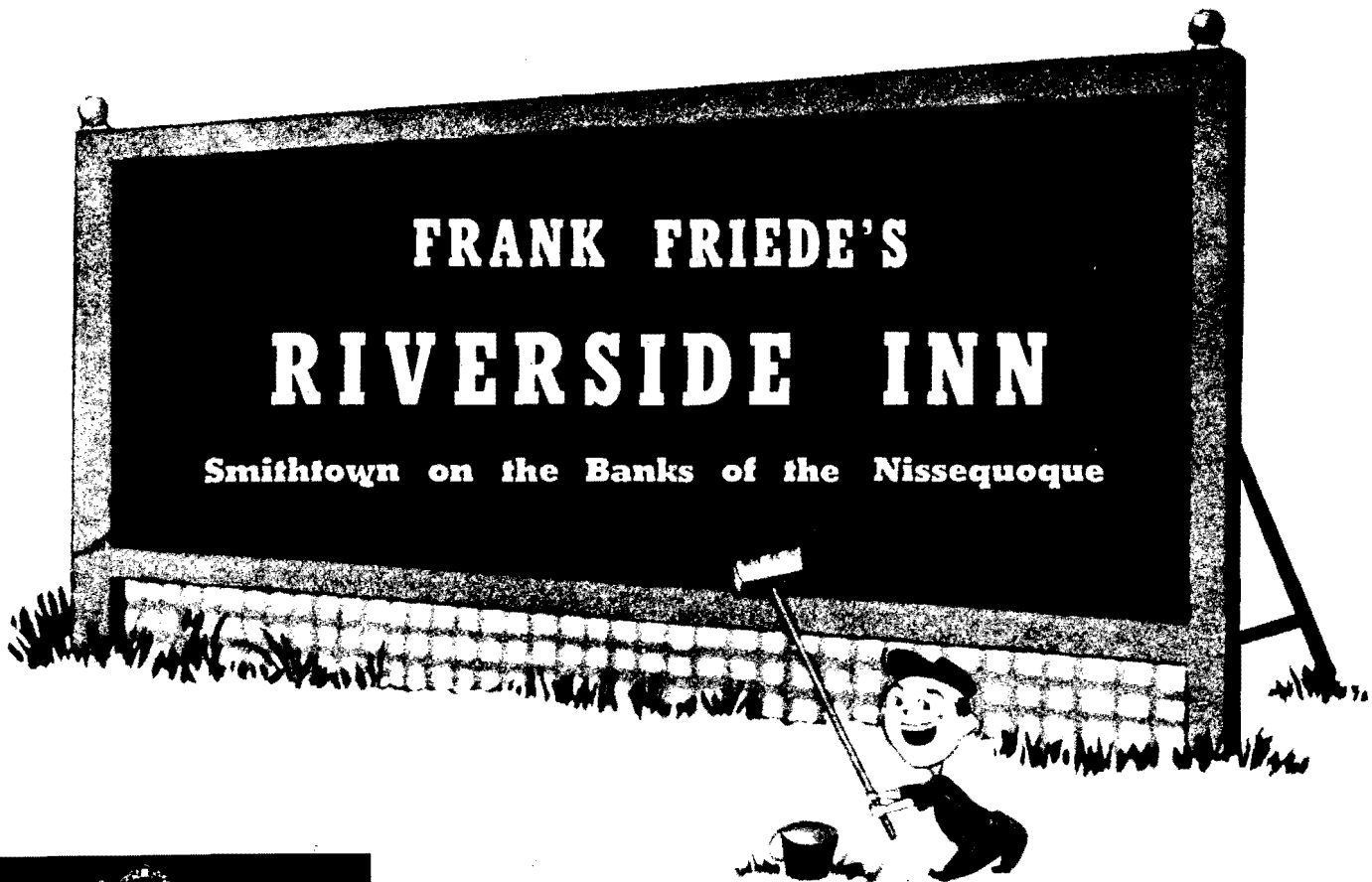

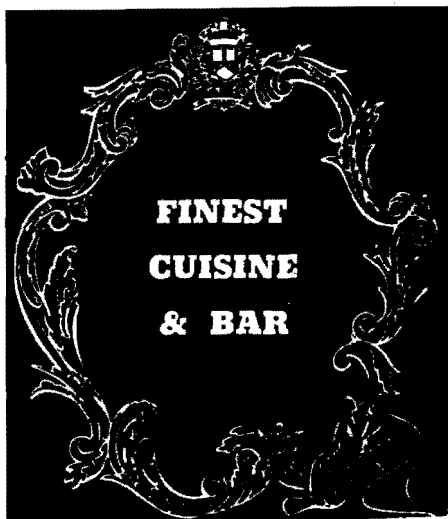

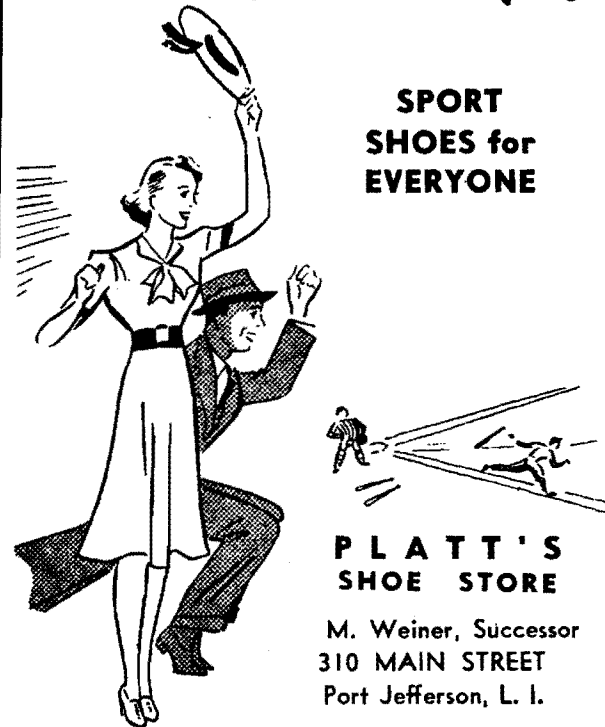
