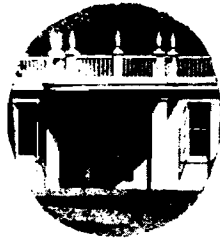

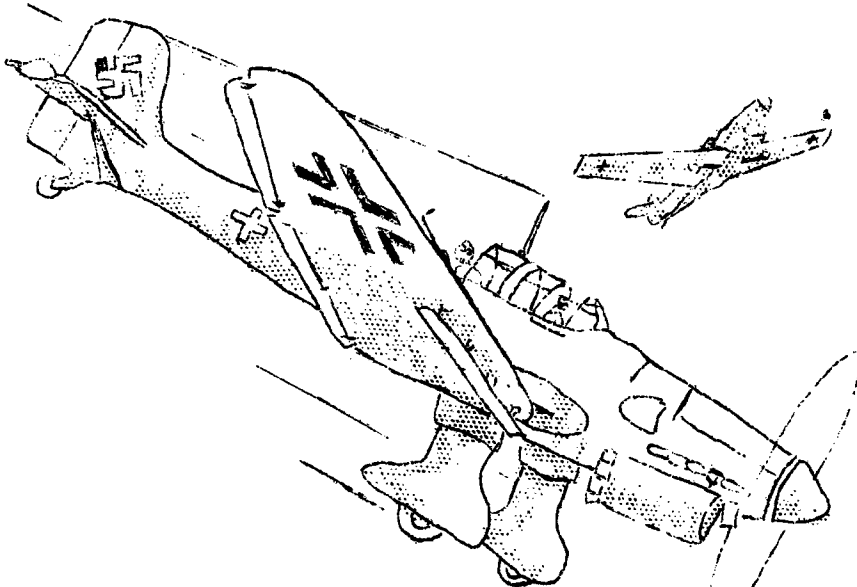

SHOREHAM ORGANIZES SUMMER CIVILIAN DEFENSE PROTECTION

At a special meeting of the Village board of Trustees, Peggy Haslett was designated Civilian Defense Coordinator for Shoreham for the summer to work in conjunction with Wesley J. Sherman.

For immediate and complete civilian fire protection during air raids, all residents of the Village of Shoreham whether property owners or tenants are hereby deputized as Fire Wardens. Residents living next to vacant houses are to include these houses within their

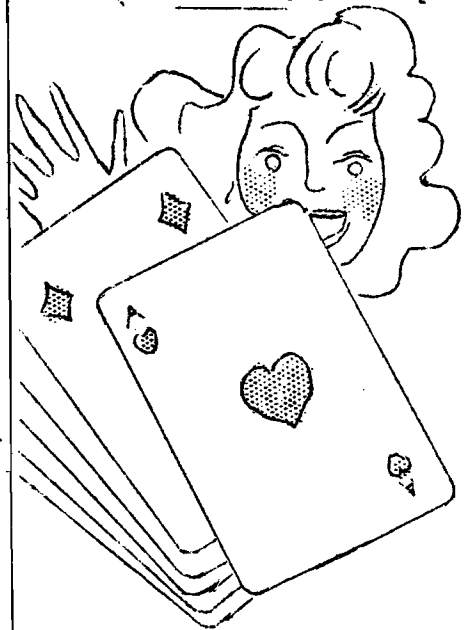
jurisdiction, even if more than one resident is so placed.

It is so imperative that each residence have garden hose of sufficient length so that when it is attached to the water spigot the stream from the nozzle will reach every point of the building or buildings occupied. Absentee owners are being asked to provide sufficient additional hose to cover their property.

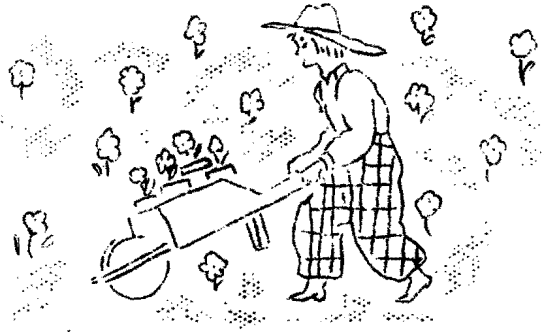
SHOREHAM CARD PARTY

HORTICULTURE



It is as much a patriotic duty to save our native wild flowers as it is to collect and preserve any early Americana. The native plants were established here long before our country was known. Help to save them for all generations to come. Many choice and interesting specimens are nearly extinct from careless destruction by unthinking admirers. Make field trips to learn the native flora, but do not destroy it. Know the Wild Flower Protection law of your state and help to save these flowers.

Cut off the flowers instead of pulling them up or breaking them off. Only gather a few blossoms from each plant, letting the rest remain to go to seed. If there is only one blossom on a plant do not take it unless it is of a very common variety growing in abundance in that vicinity.

When you pick wild flowers always leave some leaves on the stem, because a plant cannot live without leaves. Not only leave some leaves but take care also not to disturb the roots which must be nourished by the leaves of the plant to live.

It is considerate not to pick flowers along the

WEDNESDAY NIGHT DANCE

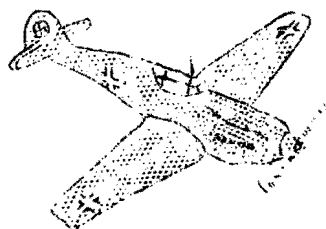

This protection of course is only auxiliary. Regular fire equipment will report as usual.

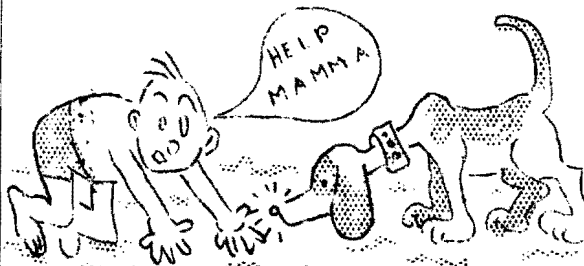

All those who have been air raid wardens during the winter are urged to volunteer their services, in Shoreham, during the summer.

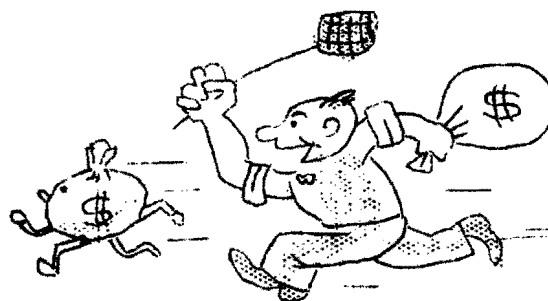

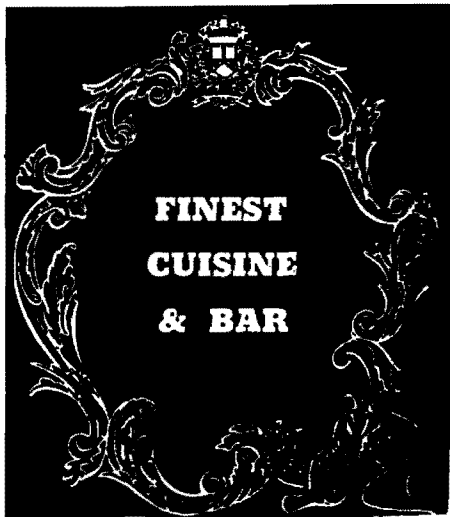
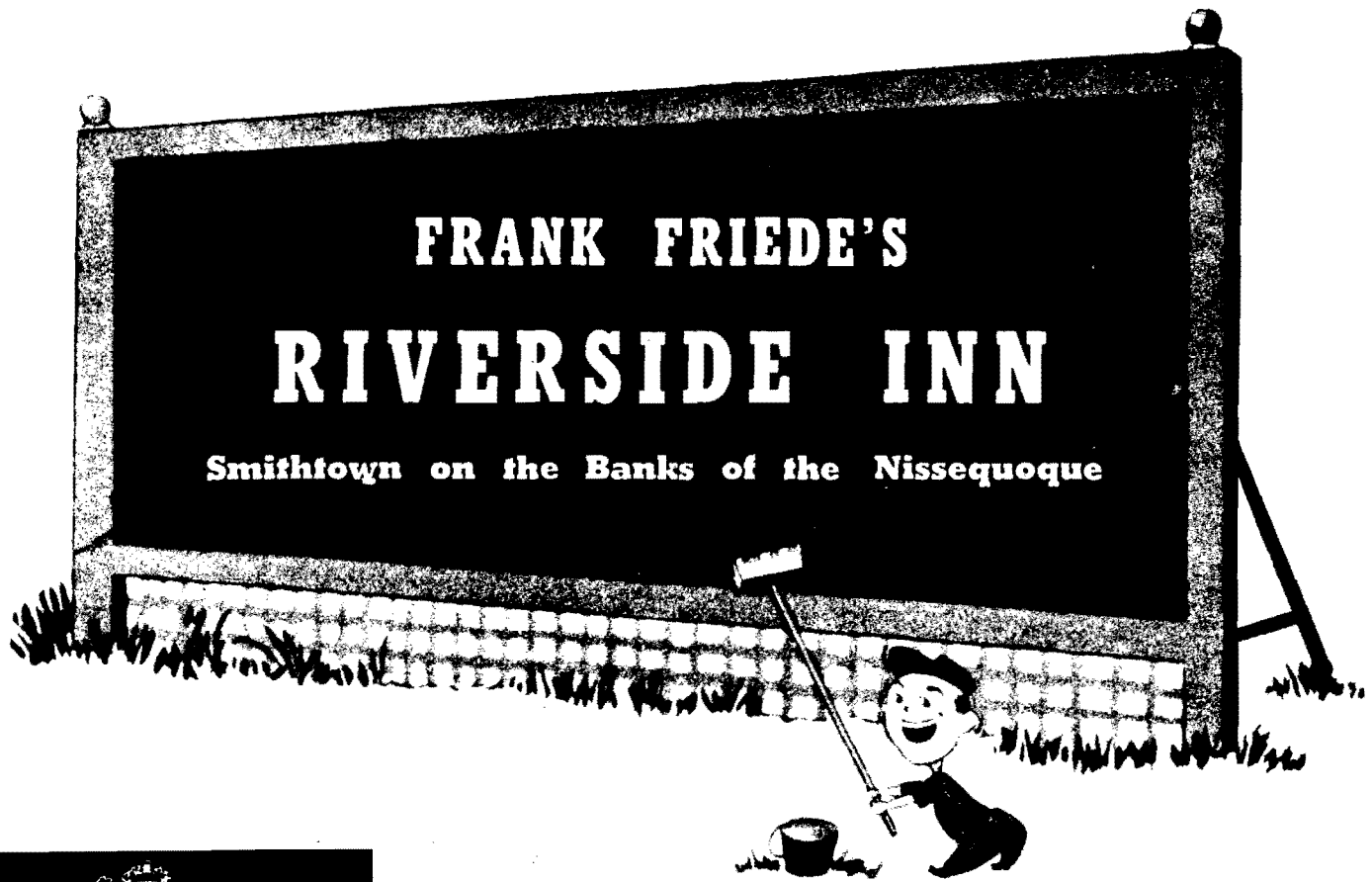
