Dear Mom and Dad: Still have not received that letter you spoke to me about when you last called. The mail is really mixed up between here and New York.

We have an inspecting General on the field now, so everyone is washing, polishing and generally straighting things up. They have a saying down here which pretty well covers the subject. "If it moves salute it if it does not move pick it up and if you can't pick it up paint it. This is just about what we are doing. I am sending home some pictures of the gang I know, and knew. Also some pictures you sent me off Shoreham. Put them in that scrap book, and I will try to get some more. Look arround and see if I have a camera, on second thought the fellows down here have enough, I can use theirs.

I hope the furlough comes through in August.

Dear Mom and Dad:

I solved last Sunday up at Clanton Alabama. It is a small field about forty miles from Selma, and takes about two hours to get to. I have had two hours solo time.

As for my position at Craig Field, well I am still hanging Tires.

I am not sure if I will be able to make it home in August.

It is hard to believe that Shoreham is in full swing now, and the Fourth of July will seem just like any other day down here. I will be in a "Big Parade" all right, but not the one Mr Varion leads. Of course that's not so bad at that, when you think about it. What I mean to say is that time doesn't mean anything in the Army. Months that once meant fun and happiness are now just something you must wait to pass, so that you can get a few days home. The time does pass quickly for me too, it's the same routine every day, and they slip by quickly.

Thanks for the big letter: and what is Herbert Frei in? the Army, Navy or what?

NEWS OF SERVICE WOMEN

Lila M. Seals, 1st Lt. Landsberg, Germany

I haven't had letters from home in two weeks. I suppose you expect me to come walking in any day, but the Army does not work that way. I am allowed to send a cable giving the approximate date of arrival— and will be going to Fort Dix from the boat or plane— I hope to fly back—

In spite of five battle stars and 95 discharge points—I will probably complete three years over here. I have stopped stewing about coming home— for there's really nothing I can do about It—I had hoped to spend at least one of the summer months in Shoreham. But please don't expect me till you recieve the cable. con't next page

Yesterday I went to Berchesgaden and Salzburg, Austria. I have never before looked upon such beautiful scenery:

We drove half-way up the mountain to the retreat—which consists of Hitler's-Goering's and Bahrman's homes and Adminestrative Building- These have all been bombed. Then we drove for 20 minutes further up- got out of the car and walked ar climbed up to the top of the mountain where the Eagles Nest is located. This building escaped Bembing and Isinfine condition. There's a circular room with a tremendous fire-place. Several reading and lounging rooms and a large diving room and a smaller one- a very nice modern kitchen. Although the weather was warm there was snow about.

It was a beautiful clear day and one could see for miles a roundlakes rested between the mountains and snow on their crests. Austria without a doubt has the most beautiful scenery of any country in which live been-especially if one likes mountainsand I do not particularly.

Germany has excellent high ways—and one can drive for at least one hundred miles without an intersection—They are six—lane highways—the Germans used them for runways for their planes after their airfields were so badly bembed. The planes were hidden in the words along the highway—yesterday we drove several miles outside of Munich, passing skeletons of planes that had been destroyed ed along the edge of the woods.

We expect to move back near Heidelberg quite soon. I am looking forward to the move for I have not becalin Heidelberg yet. I have freends stationed there an am also looking forward to meeting them again.

I have just recieved news that I leave tomorrow morning for Cannes on the Riviera. Will be gone about two weeks including travel time. I am terribly excited and busy packing. Will write from there.

June 2| I have just returned from Cannes on the Riviera-I had a splendid holiday and it was especially nice to have a change.

We-(several other nurses) had to drive 200 miles to Strausberg to get the train. From Strausberg we went to Nancy and spent the night. In the afternoon we took a Deisel train to Dijon and changed again for a train to Marsielles. We arrived there at 7 AM next day. We waited in Marseilles until 1 Pm and then took another train for Cannes which required five hours traveling.

We spent seven days in Cannes at a very nice hotel. The Riviera: reminds me a lot of Bermuda - only not nearly as nice. The Army has taken over the big hotels at Cannes for the army officers and army nurses and they (the army) have done a wonderful job making it into a recreational area. There's bathing, Bicycling - various bos trace to points of interest - dancing every evening

at the hotels - floor shows - movies and plays with actors and actresses from the States. Grace Moore was there while we were. You haven't seen anything until you see a crowd of American soldiers on a holiday - including some Navy - The enlisted men go to Nice and there are accommodations for 12,000. It rather gave one an idea of what the future American Legion conventions will be like.

We were very fortunate in getting a plane ride back in AC-47. We left Cannes at 3 PM - flew over to Nice, then back to Marsielles. We left there at 5 PM and landed 90 miles north of Munich at 8:30 PM. We stayed over night and the next day at the Air Corps Headquarters. We left there at 7PM in a bomber, B-26, flew to Sinz, Austria, then Salzburg, Austria and landed in Munich at 8:30 PM. Quite a contrast to the trip down but I would still rather be in Shoreham now.

Our unit has been transferred from the 7th Army to the 3rd Army so I haven't any idea when I will be home - Those of us who were in the African Campaign will not be going to the Pacific Theater.

Give my greetings to those who still remember me at Shoreham after almost three years absence.
