Those who gave instrumental solos were Barbara Sarkany, cello, Jim Hogeboom, trumpet, Jean Sarkany, violin, and Ester Sarkany, piano. There was a representation of the Eagle Club who sang "Down By the Old Mill Stream." There were two poems recited, one "The Wonderful World" done by Sally Streeter, and "Little Miss Moffett" by Louise Glynn. The prize of the evening was Louise Sackett who had a case of stage fright when she attempted to sing "Lazy Mary Will You Get Up" an only managed to get through the actions of waking up. Traditional Night To Be This Week-end

Last Night to Have International Fair As Central Theme

Program Has Been Arranged With Aid From Miss Jantz

With the close of every season comes the "Nite Club" night which has years been a feature of entertainment at the Shoreham Club. But like every simple thing, it is nothing more than a tradition in addition a program for the event.

This year the "Nite Club" night will be held on Saturday evening, Sept. 3. The festivities will begin as usual at the clubhouse at 10 p. m.

The history of "Nite Club" night goes back to the old Shoreham follies which were in a way an outgrowth of the dancing exhibits that were given at the end of each year by members of Miss Jantzer's dancing classes. It was during the year that Miss Jantzer was not in Shoreham that the follies came into their own. In the days when Wes Oliver's Viking Orchestra was in its prime, the first "Nite Club" night, as such, came into being, with the follies turned into a floor show and tables around the clubhouse lit by candles. When the old Log Cabin was torn down and the clubhouse took on its present appearance "Nite Club" night was put on stronger than ever and in that year there was a new record high in the club attendance for that night. The decorations were trees and vines that had been brought from the woods and tied to the ceiling. Balloons were tied in among the vines and at one part in the evening all the balloons were pulled down and broken in a noisy New Year's Eve manner.

With the redecoration of the clubhouse came Louis D'Arclay, the artist, who is responsible for the present interior decorations of the clubhouse. It was Louis who designed the first elaborate decorations for "Nite Club" night when he turned the club into a reproduction of the "Bal Tabarin" in France. Last year everything was made ship-shape when the club was turned into the S. S. Shoreham for a one night cruise around the sound.

But now we come to the gem of them all, Mrs. Sarkany, and as Mr. Lewis said recently, "She is a wonderful woman." For the past two years she has been the guiding hand for the children's mid-week dances and is responsible for the wonderful party that they had last Wednesday. A quarter with about the same time residency in Shoreham as the Sarkany's and who have in that time become as important as any other family in Shoreham is that tribe called Koch (don't try to pronounce it if you don't know how). It is Papa Koch (Frank to most of you) who is very much up to his ears in village and club politics, but like most politicians one never hears what his political feats are unless he is a third termite seeking re-election. However, in Shoreham they have a different system and candidates never have to worry about re-election. So no one ever knows what goes on in Shoreham politics.

It is with her true Shorehamite attitude that she made arrangements to bring Donald Sawyer to Shoreham last week-end and give a dancing exhibition with him. In the same manner she is coaching dances for Nite Club Night and is holding down a full schedule of rehearsals to get these numbers ready.

To all these people and to all the others in Shoreham we extend our heartiest thanks both as fellow Shorehamites and as the editor of The Shoreham Sounder. You have all been swell both to Shoreham and the Shoreham Sounder, and the editor wants to thank you all again and say what fun it has been to be able to put out this rag for the past two years. So as a parting shot, we say so-long to the 1938 season in Shoreham.
